STANDARD UTILITY ALLOWANCE (SUA) ELIGIBILITY CHANGES AND REVISIONS TO THE SHELTER TYPE CODES/STANDARD UTILITY ALLOWANCE (SUA) LEVELS DESK GUIDE (W-205HH)

<p> This procedure can now be accessed on the FIAweb.</p>	<p>Revisions to the Original Policy Bulletin:</p> <p>This policy bulletin is being revised to provide the following clarifications received from the USDA:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> households that received HEAP payments greater than \$20 in the current month or the immediately preceding 12 months are eligible for a Level I (heating/cooling) SUA even if the household currently resides in a non-HEAP eligible shelter type; HEAP payments received by a household in a shared living arrangement does not confer eligibility for a Level I SUA to other households that reside in the same dwelling unit. <p>Purpose:</p> <p>The purpose of this policy bulletin is to inform Job Center and Non Cash Assistance (NCA) Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) Center staff of the changes in the eligibility requirements to receive a heating/cooling Level I SUA as mandated by the Agricultural Act of 2014. The changes apply to SNAP certification periods that began on or after March 10, 2014.</p> <p>Section 4006 of the Agricultural Act of 2014 (a.k.a. "The Farm Bill") limits the eligibility for a heating/cooling Level I SUA to those SNAP households that incur a heating or cooling expense that is separate and apart from the household's rent or mortgage or to households that received a qualifying Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) payment. Qualifying HEAP payments are any HEAP payments received in the current or immediately preceding 12 months greater than \$20.</p>

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SNAP households that reside in a HEAP eligible living situation will no longer automatically qualify for a heating/cooling Level I SUA based solely upon reasonable anticipation that the household will receive a HEAP benefit within the next 12 months. The reasonable anticipation rule that previously allowed HEAP eligible SNAP households that incurred a shelter expense to automatically be credited with a heating/cooling Level I SUA has been eliminated.

With the elimination of the HEAP benefit anticipation rule, a determination of whether a household incurred a separate expense for heating/cooling or received qualifying HEAP payments must now be done. This determination must be made at application, recertification, and whenever a SNAP household reports a change in address or shelter expenses.

To ensure that HEAP eligible SNAP households will have received qualifying HEAP payments, the Office of Temporary Disability and Assistance (OTDA) issued \$20 HEAP supplements to active SNAP households that initially received a \$1 HEAP payment and issued \$10 HEAP supplements to active SNAP households that initially received a \$20 or \$25 HEAP benefit for the 2013-14 HEAP season. The HEAP supplement qualifies these SNAP households for the heating/cooling Level I SUA.

The mass authorization of HEAP supplements were issued by OTDA beginning on March 14, 2014, and continued until all eligible households were issued the HEAP supplement.

HEAP payments can be identified in the Welfare Management System (WMS) benefit issuance screen by the following special grant codes:

Special Grant Codes **96** and **98** have been added to list.

- **80:** Emergency HEAP payment;
- **82:** Direct HEAP payment to LIPA (currently PSEG);
- **84:** NPA HEAP payment;
- **90:** Direct HEAP payment to Con Ed; and
- **91:** Direct HEAP payment to National Grid
- **96:** HEAP Fair Hearing
- **98:** Regular HEAP vendor payment

New information

Note: HEAP payments received by one household residing in the dwelling unit does not confer eligibility for a heating/cooling Level I SUA to the other households within that same dwelling unit. The HEAP payments only confer eligibility for a Level I SUA to the SNAP household that received the HEAP payments.

There are three SUA levels:

Level I SUA

The heating/cooling Level I SUA covers heating and air conditioning, utilities and telephone costs. It is available to households:

- that own their own home;
- that are regularly billed separately from their rent for heating and/or air conditioning (including residents of public or subsidized housing that incur a surcharge for the cost of air conditioning);
- that pay separately for electricity and owns and operates an air conditioner; or
- that have received HEAP payments greater than \$20 in the current month or in the immediately preceding 12 months.

Since some source of home heating is required for all homeowners in New York, if the SNAP household owns their own home, they are assumed to incur separate heating costs. Therefore, they are eligible for the heating/cooling Level I SUA.

Information provided by and attested to by the household during the application or recertification process regarding the SNAP household's home ownership or incurrence of a separate expense for heating or air conditioning is acceptable verification to qualify the household for a heating/cooling Level I SUA unless the information is questionable. This includes information provided on a signed application or recertification application or obtained during the application or recertification interview.

Revised

Even if the household has moved from the dwelling where they lived when the qualifying HEAP benefit was issued, the household remains eligible for the heating/cooling Level I SUA even if the household's new residence is in a non-HEAP eligible shelter type.

Revised

Households that were eligible for a heating/cooling Level I SUA at the time of the most recent application or recertification solely because they received qualifying HEAP payments, retain eligibility for the Level I SUA at least until the household's next recertification.

Supplemental heating

Note: Utility costs for the operation of a space heater, electric blanket, heat lamp, cooking stove and related items when used as a supplemental heating source do not qualify a household for the heating/cooling Level I SUA. In addition, the cost of an electric blower for an oil or gas furnace does not qualify a household for the heating/cooling Level I SUA.

To issue a heating/cooling Level I SUA to households, the Job Opportunity Specialist (JOS)/Worker must enter an “X” in the **FSUA:IND** field or make a numeric entry in the **TYPE** (Fuel Type) field on the **NSBL02** screen of the WMS budget if the household incurs a fuel for heating expense.

Level II SUA

The Level II SUA includes all utility costs (other than heating or air conditioning) and telephone expenses. It includes:

- electricity;
- cooking fuel;
- sewage;
- trash collection;
- water fees;
- fuel for heating water; and
- propane gas and/or the rental fee for a propane tank.

Households that do not meet the criteria for a heating/cooling Level I SUA and are billed separately for at least one of these utilities (other than telephone) are eligible for a Level II SUA.

Information provided by and attested to by the household during the application or recertification process regarding the SNAP household’s incurrence of a separate expense for any of the utility costs listed above is acceptable verification to qualify the household for a Level II SUA unless the information is questionable.

To issue a Level II SUA, the JOS/Worker must enter an “X” in the **FSUT:IND** field on the **NSBL02** screen of the WMS budget.

Level III SUA

The Level III SUA covers the cost of basic service plus tax for one telephone. WMS will automatically provide a Level III SUA for all Shelter Type Codes except **23** (Undomiciled) that do not meet the criteria for a Level I or II SUA even if they do not have a telephone.

Shelter Type Code **23** households that received qualifying HEAP payments are eligible for the Level I SUA. If the household is budgeted with a Level I SUA, it will not receive the homeless shelter deduction. If the household has not received qualifying HEAP payments, the household will not receive any level of SUA but will receive the homeless shelter deduction.

New information

No SUA

The following shelter types are not eligible for any SUA level:

- **04** Room and Board
- **19** Approved Medical Facilities – Non Hospital

Shelter Type Codes **04** and **19** are used on CA-only budgets where SUA eligibility is not applicable.

WMS Update

Effective June 21, 2014 with software release 14.2, WMS has been programmed to eliminate the automatic authorization of a heating/cooling Level I SUA based on residing in a HEAP eligible dwelling and incurring a shelter expense.

New information

Effective February 14, 2015 with software release 15.1, WMS has been programmed to allow the authorization of a heating/cooling Level I SUA for the following shelter type codes:

- **06** Hotel/Motel Temporary
- **11** Room Only
- **13** Residential Programs for Victims of Domestic Violence (Less Than 3 Meals Per Day)
- **14** Residential Programs for Victims of Domestic Violence (3 Meals Per Day)
- **23** Undomiciled
- **33** Homeless Shelter - Tier I or II (Less Than 3 Meals Per Day)
- **34** Homeless Shelter - Tier II (3 Meals Per Day)
- **35** Homeless Shelter - Non Tier I Non Tier II

POS Update

POS has also been programmed to reflect the changes in SUA eligibility and will require Job Opportunity Specialists (JOS)/Workers to determine a households eligibility for a heating/cooling Level I SUA based on the household incurring a separate heating/cooling expense or having received qualifying HEAP payments.

POS has updated the question regarding HEAP as follows:

Old question:

“Did the household receive, or does it anticipate receiving HEAP this year?”

New question:

“Did the household receive a HEAP payment totaling greater than \$20 in the current month or in the immediately preceding 12 months?”

POS will do a check of benefit issuance in WMS to determine if a household has received qualifying HEAP payments.

Revised **W-205HH**.

Staff should use the Shelter Type Codes/Standard Utility Allowance (SUA) Levels Desk Guide (**W-205HH**) for help in determining the correct SUA level. The **W-205HH** has been revised to reflect the changes in the eligibility to receive a heating/cooling Level I SUA and to reflect the clarifications received from the USDA.

A sample of the revised **W-205HH** is attached.

Job Center Directors and NCA SNAP Center Directors must ensure that all previous versions of Form **W-205HH** are removed from circulation and recycled.
