I. PURPOSE

To advise social services districts of the closed-ended federal Social Services Block Grant Funds (Title XX) for the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 1991/92.

II. BACKGROUND

New York State's share of the total \$2.8 billion federal Social Services Block Grant Funds (Title XX) for FFY 1991/92 is \$201,329,127. While these figures are based upon the most recent federal allotments to states under the federal Social Services Block Grant for FFY 1992, we must caution districts that they remain subject to possible revision including reduction by the sequestration formula of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1989. Any such reductions in the federal Social Services Block Grant Funds received by New York State would result in a corresponding reduction in the attached local district allocations.

In addition, the current state budget does not contain any state funding match to the federal allocation(s). The state has however maintained it's commitment to the provision of mandated services such as Preventive through continued funding of the services overclaim and expedited reimbursement approaches. Ongoing efforts related to the maximization of available federal funds for programs such as Emergency Assistance to Families (EAF) also continue to be a department priority.

III.PROGRAM IMPLICATIONS

As in the past, two percent of the total New York State allocation has been withheld for training purposes, leaving the amounts listed in the attached Appendix as the total district allocation. With the exception of the training allotment, all federal Social Services Block Grant Funds to be received are allocated to the social services districts. As has been the practice in previous years, the distribution of current funds is based on the relationship between each district's 90/91 allocation to the total FFY 90/91 allocation.

For example, Albany County's FFY 91/92 allocation is determined as follows:

- 1. \$201,329,127 2% Training Allocation = \$197,302,544 All Districts'
 91/92 Allocation.
- 2. \$2,429,051 (Albany County 90/91 Allocation) = .0122184467
 \$198,801,948 (All Districts' 90/91 Allocation)
- 3. $\$197,302,544 \times .01221844467 = \$2,410,731$ Albany County Allocation for 91/92.
- <u>Note</u>: Social services district services training expenditures are claimed as Title XX expenditures.

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IV. REQUIRED ACTION

The attached amounts represent each district's share of the federal Social Services Block Grant allocation for services expenditures based on the original allocation and should be used in planning for the delivery of services.

As in prior years, any unused service funds will be reallocated among those districts having expenditures in excess of this close-ended allocation at the end of Federal Fiscal Year 1991/92.

It should also be noted that based upon the most recent data available at the federal level, local districts can anticipate receiving approximately the same allocation amount in FFY 92/93 as in FFY 91/92.

V. SYSTEMS IMPLICATIONS

VI.EFFECTIVE DATE

This directive is effective September 21, 1992 retroactive to October 1, 1991.
